■ overview

At AMBS, spiritual formation is a foundational part of all study, with the Master of Arts in Christian Formation as the one program that focuses primarily on the church's ministries of personal and communal formation and transformation. Students in this program work alongside others being developed in crucial areas of Christian ministry: pastoring, teaching, counseling, academics. Our approach to spiritual formation is not in isolation from these vital expressions of the Christian faith but sees them as integrally related.

Our course of studies offers a well-rounded program of Scripture, history, theology, ethics and ministry formation, as well as courses in one's concentration.

We respond to current interest in spiritual formation and honor the wider traditions of spiritual formation. While we appreciate what can be learned from other Christians, we specifically explore how Anabaptist-Mennonites understand and engage in Christian spiritual formation.

We strongly appreciate the role of intellectual and theological challenges in this work. At AMBS, you will be part of a Christian community where faculty, staff and students are involved actively in their own Christian development and formation.

■ programs of study

In the Master of Arts in Christian Formation degree program, students complete 60 credit hours. Courses in the program span the breadth of the AMBS curriculum, including courses in Bible, theology, history and ethics together with courses focusing more specifically on spiritual guidance, Christian spirituality and spiritual disciplines. Your program of study will include a practicum and opportunities for practical experience in spiritual direction, both as a directee and director, and in other aspects of ministry.

For the Certificate in Christian Spiritual Formation, students take core courses and a practicum to enhance their work of fostering spiritual growth in their congregations.

■ ministry options

Training in spiritual formation at AMBS has several possibilities for ministry. Some students also engage in these studies for their own spiritual growth, faith enhancement, or to deal with important issues that they face. While the MA in Christian Formation is not intended for the training of sole or lead pastors of congregations, it is beneficial for those already

involved in pastoral ministry. It is a good program for associate or assistant pastors with primary responsibilities in the area of discipleship or spiritual formation. This training is also useful for those involved in teaching, spiritual guidance, and youth ministries in the church.

■ key resources

As well as having an excellent library (with knowledgeable and helpful staff) and faculty with expertise in various areas, AMBS has given considerable attention and resources to enhancing the spiritual formation of its students.

We encourage the practice of **spiritual disciplines** in various ways. Practicing spiritual disciplines is required in several classes, and students and faculty have the opportunity to pray the Daily Office together, to participate in weekly intercessory and centering prayer sessions and to use the prayer labyrinth for meditation time. Spiritual disciplines seminars are available in areas of prayer, journaling, Scripture and family spirituality. Other classes address Christian spirituality and peacemaking, contemporary spirituality, and the history of Christian spirituality.

Corporate worship in our unique and lovely chapel is at the center of AMBS life. Our worship involves shared leadership and incorporates a variety of styles. Monthly Evening Song and Prayer worship services are patterned after the ecumenical worship services of the Taizé community in France.

Various locations on campus encourage the practice of **prayer**, including several prayer rooms, locations for spiritual guidance, and an outdoor labyrinth.

AMBS generally offers at least two **spiritual formation retreats** per semester and publicizes retreats in the area. The seminary is within easy access of several **retreat centers**.

We subsidize **spiritual guidance** for students and also provide training in this important ministry.

As Christian spirituality is connected to the **Body of Christ**, we foster community life in many ways. Students are invited to participate in forums, daily breaks, chapel services, choir ensemble, and in a local congregation.

AMBS promotes engagement with the neighborhood and wider world through particular courses, the peace committee, opportunities for service and volunteering, and public witness.
